
Full-board accommodation in host family, with breakfast and dinner in the family and packed lunch (Monday-Friday)

### **LOCATION**



Students attend their classes in Alexandra College, Milltown, Dublin. Host families will be located within easy access to the school, either walking distance or on a direct bus or tram (LUAS) route. The school is connected to the city centre by the Luas line.

YOUR FIRST DAY	
9:00	Arrive at Alexandra College – your host family will either bring you or explain to you how to arrive at the school
9:30	Welcome/Introduction for all young adult students with our Centre Manager. Receive Emerald ID card, travel pass.
10:00	City Centre Orientation
12:30	Lunch (packed lunch from host family)
13:30	Written and spoken placement test
14:30	Alexandra campus tour/orientation
15:30	Meet teacher and new classmates. Begin first English Lesson

### **SCHOOL INFORMATION**

Alexandra College is well served by public transport including the green LUAS (tram) line and a number of Dublin Bus routes, which pass nearby the school grounds.

LUAS and Bus Services: The school is within 5 minutes walk of Milltown LUAS stop and only a few minutes from the 11 and 44 bus routes.

### **TRANSPORT**

Your host family will show you how to get to school on your first day. During orientation you will be provided with your transport pass, which you will then use to come and go from school every day. Don't hesitate to ask if you have any questions.

Your transport pass will be provided to you on arrival or on your first morning in Emerald (depending on your arrival schedule). It is important to carry it with you at all time to avoid getting a fine. Lost transport passes will only be replaced at an extra cost, these are your own responsibility and we recommend you keep it stored safely in your purse or wallet.

### **MEALS**

All your meals are included. You will have breakfast and dinner at home with your host family and they will provide you with a packed lunch to bring to school every day.

At the weekend, you will also be provided with a packed lunch on the day of your excursion. Your host family will provide you with sheets and towels and will offer to do laundry on a weekly basis.

### **TUTORS**

You will have a tutor at Alexandra College, where your classes are held.

During the week, you will meet your tutor every day. Your tutor will inform you of your programme and you can talk to them if you have any issues or questions.

### **LESSONS & ACTIVITIES**

Lessons are 60 minutes long. Classes are Monday to Friday afternoons.

**Evening activities will take place twice a week**; your tutor will inform you of the time and meeting point.

Students are expected to return to their host families no later than 11pm every evening.

Students have two half-day activities and one full-day excursion per week. Your tutor will inform you of your scheduled weekly activities.

If you have any questions or issues, please speak to your tutor.

Three afternoons per week you will have free time and are expected to return to your host family for your evening meal.



#### **ATTENDANCE**

Attendance at class is compulsory and is the responsibility of each student.

Students are required to attend evening activities organised by the school.

#### **DRINKING**

It is illegal for anyone under the age of 18 to buy, attempt to buy or consume alcohol in Ireland.

It is also illegal to obtain alcohol for anybody below the minimum age. Please be aware of these laws at all times. Students caught drinking or in possession of alcohol will be sent home.

#### **SMOKING**

Smoking is not permitted and smoking indoors is always prohibited.

#### **DRUGS**

Illicit drug use in Ireland will result in heavy punishments. There are strict laws in Ireland against the use of illegal drugs.

### **PICKPOCKETS**

Be vigilant with your wallet/purse or other valuables particularly when travelling in a group. Don't carry large amounts of cash with you, only carry what you need.

It is not necessary for you to carry your passport with you in Ireland. Instead leave it at home in a safe place. If your wallet/purse or other valuables have been lost or stolen, report all items at the nearest Garda station.

### **SHOPLIFTING**

Shoplifting is not tolerated in Ireland and will result in an arrest and possibly prosecution if an individual is found guilty of shoplifting.

#### FIRE

All students must leave the building if a fire alarm is sounded. Tampering with the fire extinguishers or smoke detectors or setting off a false fire alarm will be cause for severe disciplinary action and a substantial fine.

#### **RESPECT YOUR HOST FAMILY**

Please do not make any noise in your room, corridor or in the shared areas that could disturb other residents of the house.

Students must be respectful of the furniture and fixtures of the home & any damage or breakages must be paid for.

### **HOST FAMILY RULES**

### DO:

Carry your student card given to you by the Emerald Cultural Institute. It has all of the contact information for the host family and school.

Stay with the guide and group at all times when on activities and excursions.

Look right before crossing the road.

Remember that in Ireland cars travel on the left.

Give the host family a letter from the school when you have any evening or weekend activities as soon as you receive it.

Be friendly and polite with your host family and other students staying there.

Respect the host family's house rules.

Respect your curfew time of 11pm.

There are no exceptions to this rule even with permission from parents or guardians.

Your host family will inform us if you do not return home in time.

### DON'T:

Carry large sums of money with you.

Carry your passport around with you.

In Ireland it is not necessary to carry official identification with you.

Buy cigarettes or alcohol; it is illegal for anyone under 18 and is against the school rules.

Enter premises licensed to sell alcohol (e.g. a pub)

Students may not stay in the host family home during normal school hours unless they are ill.

Students will not be given a key to the house.

Make sure to watch some Irish sport – Gaelic Football, Hurling and Rugby all make for an exciting afternoon!



### **GENERAL & PRACTICAL INFORMATION**



### **MEDICAL INFORMATION**

All students studying in Ireland should obtain appropriate medical insurance in their own country before departure. Students travelling from EU countries should bring their European Health Insurance with them. Non-EU students should bring a copy of their insurance policy with them when travelling.

Our on-site team will be happy to assist with making the arrangements for students who require medical attention. We would ask that parents or group leaders inform us at the time of booking about any conditions or relevant medical information which we should be aware of, so we can inform our staff.


Students should cover the cost of transport if required for any medical visits. Group leaders are required to accompany their students to doctors/ hospitals and for individual junior students a member of our staff will accompany and stay them.

### **SAFETY**

We advise all students not to carry large amounts of cash, ID or travel documents on their person during their stay.

### SMOKING/ ALCOHOL/ ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES

Smoking is prohibited inside the school property. Alcohol is strictly forbidden on campus. Consumption or possession of alcohol or any illegal substances will result in immediate expulsion.





### **HEALTH & SAFETY**

As part of their welcome orientation students and group leaders are required to attend a short briefing on the Safety regulations. The briefing includes an introduction to life in the school, security of personal property and fire safety.

Group leaders and students will also receive details of First Aid procedures, which they should follow in the event of an accident.

### **EMERALD STUDENT IDENTITY CARD**

All students are issued with an Emerald Cultural Institute student ID card on their arrival. Students should carry their student ID with them at all times.

### STUDENT SUPERVISION

Our team of Managers, Teachers and our Activity leaders are there to provide the highest level of service to our students during their stay. Our students' welfare is a priority on all our programmes and our staff are there to ensure that students enjoy every aspect of their stay with us.

In their orientation students meet the staff that will assist them during their stay and accompany them on their activities.

### **DISCIPLINE AND BREACH OF CONDUCT**

If students' behaviour or conduct is unsatisfactory or in breach of the school regulations, they will be subject to our disciplinary procedures. A serious breach of conduct may result in expulsion.
